Copy Writing

Part 6

Colour

Don't overdo it! Too many colours can cause distractions and again make reading harder. Be wary of overlaying text onto coloured backgrounds. How many times have you picked up a brochure and found certain pieces of text hard to read because of the background colour?

Some suggest using around three colours, your main colour, a complementary colour and a contrasting colour.

Remember that some people are colour-blind. Years ago I made the mistake of building a webpage with red text on a green background and that created problem for people with red-green colour blindness. Red-green is a very common and according to Wikipedia it affects 5% of males.

Back to Pictures

"A picture's worth a thousand words" OK perhaps it can be but are they the right words? Make sure the picture is relevant to the theme of your writing and matches up with the words you've written.

Don't be tempted to cram too many images on to one page, doing so makes the page look cluttered.

A photograph works best when it shows an activity taking place that is related to the text it is supporting. If the piece relates to a troupe of showgirls with the objective of getting work in cabaret floor shows then an action shot of the girls on stage, in their feathers, would be perfect. For a dance band you could use an action shot of the band at work and use a shot of a full dance floor to emphasise that particular beneficial outcome.

More Odds & Ends

Email

Research has shown the best and most effective time to send out an email shot, business to business (B2B), is either a Tuesday or a Wednesday. Mondays are not good because people are catching up after the weekend whereas on Thursdays and Fridays they are starting to wind down for the weekend. This means they are busy clearing their desks.

When you are emailing direct to the consumer of your service (B2C) then a Thursday or Friday seems to be the best time.

There is also a best time of day for getting a response and that's either 10am to 11am or lunchtime. It's best not to send at night or first thing in the morning because your email will probably be lost amongst a mass of other emails. In addition people tend to go about clearing out their inbox as first job of the day so your message may fall victim to

an overzealous clear out.

Above the fold

In newspaper terminology there is an expression “above the fold”. This refers to broadsheets and the fact they are so large that they need folding over to make them comfortable to read. Everything “above the fold” is visible and everything below the fold is hidden and you need to turn the paper to read it.

This terminology is now used for websites. Everything you see on the screen, before you start to scroll down, is said to be ‘above the fold’. The rest of the content is below the fold and you need to take the additional action of scrolling down to view it.

When you layout your copy for a website it is important to show the Attention and Interest elements of your writing above the fold. The reason is simple. These are the elements that will encourage your reader to read more and to scroll down or click through to the next page.

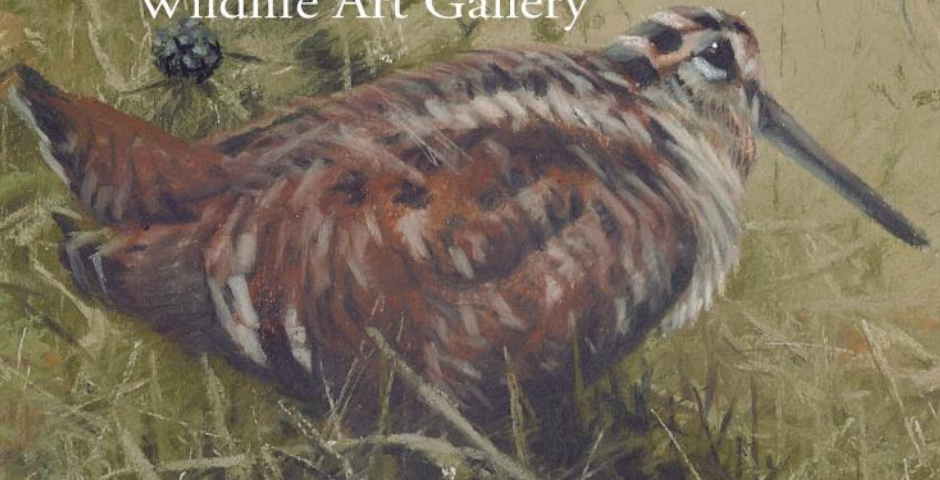

Council care calculations called into question

North Yorkshire Council has been told to re-calculate how much a woman should pay for her care after the Local Government and Social Care Ombudsman found issues with its predecessor's sums.

The family of a woman, who sold her house when she moved into a care home, complained the former county council had wrongly taken into account money the woman had given relatives as gifts when calculating how much she should contribute to her costs.

The council was satisfied the money – totalling nearly £20,000 – was not given away to avoid paying more for her care home fees. This should have meant the council disregarded it when calculating how much she would have to pay. However, it did not do this, and the woman contributed towards the cost of her care for longer than she potentially should have done, and was left with outstanding care home fees she could not pay.

The Local Government and Social Care Ombudsman remedies injustice and shares learning from investigations to help improve public, and adult social care, services. In this case the Ombudsman has asked the council to complete a new financial assessment to calculate what her contribution should have been from the point her

money fell below the capital limit for paying for care. It should also reimburse any overpayments the new assessment shows she has made and pay any outstanding fees it is responsible for.

The Ombudsman's findings were made against the former council, however the new unitary authority will carry out the recommendations.

Have you heard of the Warm Home Discount Scheme?

You could get £150 off your electricity bill for winter.

You qualify if you either:

- get the guarantee credit element of pension credit
- are on a low income and have high energy costs

You should get a letter between October 2023 and early January 2024 if:

- you're eligible for the scheme.
- you might be eligible for the scheme, but you need to give more information

If you need to give more information, your letter will tell you to call the helpline by 29 February 2024 to confirm your details.

If you're eligible for the scheme, your letter will confirm you do not need to do anything. You'll receive the discount automatically and your electricity supplier will apply the discount to your bill by 31 March 2024.

If you do not get a letter

Contact the Warm Home Discount Scheme if you do not get the letter by early January 2024 and you think you're eligible. You must contact them before 29 February 2024.

Old Stinker

The East Yorkshire Werewolf

I've touched on Old Stinker in an earlier issue of the newsletter but let's now intertwine the strands of folklore and reality as we explore the story of this strange creature.



Old Stinker, also known as the “Beast of Barmston Drain” and “the Werewolf of Flixton”, has been a part of Yorkshire folklore since the 1100’s, with at least seven modern day sightings reported as recently as 2016.

Old Stinker is reputed to stand eight feet tall, possess glowing red eyes, and a bushy tail so strong it could knock someone off their feet. His breath is said

to be extremely foul, hence the moniker Old Stinker.

In folklore and film a werewolf is an individual who can shape-shift into a wolf-like creature. The transformation of a man into a werewolf is termed lycanthropy. Some suggest this term originates from the name Lycaon, a king in Greek mythology who was turned into a wolf by Zeus. However, it appears to derive from the ancient Greek words “lukos”, meaning wolf, and “anthropos”, meaning man. The Old English term “werwulf” (man-wolf) evolved into the modern day word werewolf.

Werewolf trials were prevalent across Europe during the 15th, 16th, and 17th centuries, coinciding with the witch trials. However, a conviction of lycanthropy carried

a far harsher penalty than those meted out to alleged witches.

While I found no evidence of such trials in England, there are gruesome accounts from the continent. The most horrific execution was that of Peter Stumpff/ Stumpf, known as ‘the Werewolf of Bedburg’, in 1589. A German farmer and purported serial killer, he was accused and convicted of werewolfery. His

punishment was so brutally severe that I prefer not to detail it here. For those interested, more information is available online.

One proposed cure for lycanthropy was the medicinal use of Wolfsbane, also known as Monkshood. Despite producing a beautiful flower, this plant is highly toxic and can cause cardiac arrest and respiratory paralysis even just touching it can cause major problems. Thus, this so-called cure seems more likely to result in death or serious illness. Interestingly, folklore also cites Wolfsbane as a werewolf repellent and killer.

Returning to our local werewolf, Old Stinker. In May 2016, the Express newspaper reported a woman's account of witnessing a man transform into an eight-foot werewolf near Barmston Drain, just outside Hull. She described the creature as "standing upright one moment and running on all fours the next. It then leapt 30ft over to the other side of the embankment and disappeared into some allotments."

On another occasion, Hull & East Yorkshire News reported a claim of a "tall and hairy" beast jumping an 8ft fence, carrying a German Shepherd in its jaws. This sparked a full-scale werewolf hunt.

Historical accounts of Old Stinker date back to the 1100's, when a wolf-like creature reportedly killed and devoured farm animals, a young girl, and a shepherd. In the late 18th century, a stagecoach traveling along the York Road near Flixton was ambushed by a "wolf-

like monster". The occupants fired shots to fend it off. In the 1960s, a lorry driver reported seeing two glowing red eyes. When he slowed down to investigate, a "huge wolf-like creature" lunged at the lorry and attempted to break through the windscreen.

Whether Old Stinker is a product of myth or a real entity lurking in the moonlit nights remains a captivating mystery.

So, dear traveller, as you tread the moon kissed paths of the Yorkshire Wolds, keep a watchful eye for the elusive Old Stinker – the werewolf with a chilling history - and very pongy breath.

The twelve days of Christmas would have been a most welcome break for the workers on the land, which would have been the majority of the people. All work, except for looking after the animals, would stop, restarting again on Plough Monday, the first Monday after Twelfth Night. The 'Twelfths' had strict rules, one of which banned spinning, the prime occupation for women.

But back to carols. My favourite carol is "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear", and verse three is my favourite verse of it.

Yet with the woes of sin and strife
The world has suffered long;
Beneath the angel-strain have rolled
Two thousand years of wrong;
And man, at war with man, hears not
The love-song which they bring;
O hush the noise, ye men of strife,
And hear the angels sing.



That phrase "and man, at war with man, hears not" comes to mind most of the times I pray. As a race, we are too tied up in our own petty rivalries to hear the message of peace that Christmas brings.

May I wish you the most fantastic Christmas, may all your dreams come true, and I hope you find some time for quiet and relaxation amidst all the rush and bustle. But I also hope you find time to hear the message of peace which arrived with the birth of a baby, in a stable, some two thousand years ago. Not only hear it but act upon it, too.

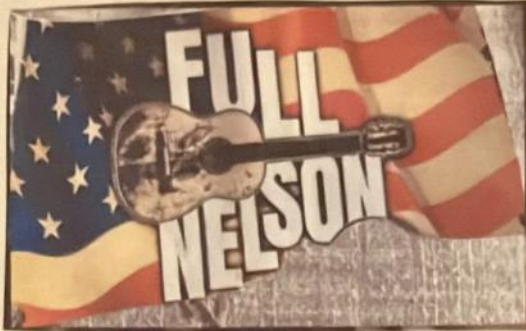
